



Good Faith Estimate

You have the right to receive a “good faith estimate” explaining how much your medical care will cost if you are un-insured or not using your medical insurance for services in our clinic. Under the law, health care providers are required to provide an estimate for medical services to the patient.

- You have the right to receive a Good Faith Estimate for the total expected costs of any non-emergency services or items. This includes related costs like medical tests, office visits, and lab tests.
- Make sure your health care provider gives you a Good Faith Estimate in writing at least one business day before your medical services. To be eligible for a good faith estimate, you **MUST** make your appointment at **LEAST** 3 days prior to the scheduled visit.
- If you receive a bill that is at least \$400 more than your Good Faith Estimate, you can dispute the bill according to the steps outlined on the CMS website.
- Make sure to save a copy or picture of your Good Faith Estimate.
